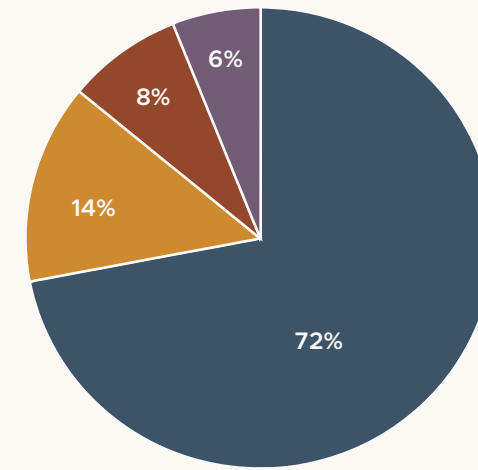
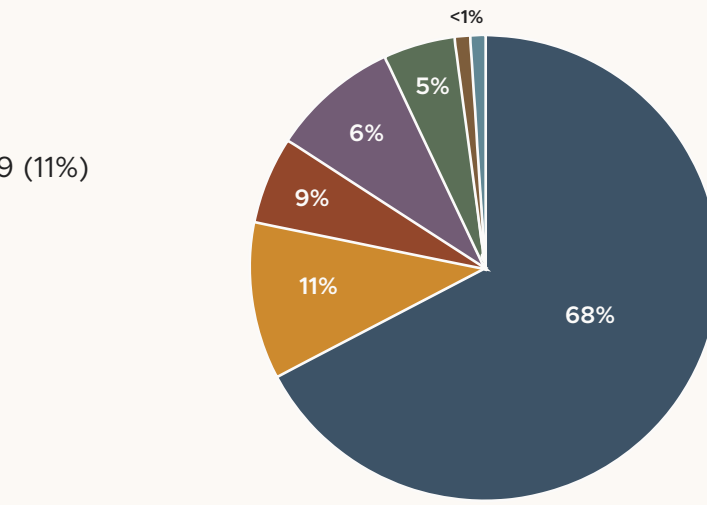

President's Letter

As we emerge from the grips of the global pandemic, our perspective on sustainability, resilience and community health has been altered in profound ways, perhaps for generations to come. No longer are once-abstract concepts of social cohesion, supply chain resilience or natural capital divorced from our everyday lives. Instead, we energetically applauded the heroic efforts of health care workers, vaccine innovators, and the men and women who kept our food, energy and water systems functioning in the darkest moments. But we also felt grateful for the solace and refuge of nature, shattering records of outdoor recreation even as Covid reminded us of the interdependence of our natural and human-built systems.

At Sustainable Northwest, 2020 redoubled our zeal and commitment to playing our part by navigating the complex channels between the private sector, government and local communities to find solutions to our most pressing natural resource challenges. In 2020, SNW:

- Played a critical role in breaking the logjam that threatened dam removal and put the ambitious plan to revitalize the Klamath river back on track;
- Combined deep expertise in wildfire and forestry with millions in funding to launch an ambitious two-year public-private partnership to accelerate on-the-ground forest health and wildfire risk reduction treatments adjacent to communities and critical assets west of Medford and into the Applegate Valley;
- Launched an innovative electric tractor program, with electric tractors piloted on farms, orchards, vineyards and more across Oregon --- the first dedicated statewide effort to test, prove, and scale electrification in agricultural equipment; and
- Provided critical assistance to the Darrington Forest Collaborative and several other forest collaboratives to increase the pace, scale, and quality of forest and watershed restoration.

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2020 Highlights

WEST BEAR ALL LANDS & WILDFIRE RESILIENCE

Oregon has experienced year after year of record-breaking wildfires, threatening human health in at-risk communities and harming forest ecosystems. Nowhere is this risk more pronounced than the growing communities of southwest Oregon.

The Southwest Integrated Forest and Fire Treatment (SWIFFT) program is an ambitious 2-year public-private partnership to accelerate on-the-ground forest health and wildfire risk reduction treatments adjacent to communities and critical assets west of Medford and into the Applegate Valley. This collaboration between public agencies, communities, and philanthropy will be an innovative, results-driven model that demonstrates near term benefits, while advocating increased investments commensurate to the scale of the problem.



DARRINGTON FOREST COLLABORATIVE

Sustainable Northwest provided critical assistance to the Darrington Collaborative and the Mt. Baker-Snoqualmie Forest Service leadership team, who signed a joint letter of agreement in the fall of 2020. The agreement outlines expectations for communication and engagement for how the Collaborative and the Forest Service work together on forest restoration projects in the Mt. Baker-Snoqualmie National Forest.

The Darrington Collaborative, launched in 2015, is a partnership between diverse interests such as major conservation organizations, local STEM education programs, the local timber industry, and the community of Darrington, with the goal of increasing ecologically sustainable timber harvests in the Darrington region, creating jobs, and improving and restoring the health of forests and watersheds across Northwest Washington.



KLAMATH DAMS REMOVAL

Following a fierce advocacy campaign by a broad coalition of dam removal supporters, negotiators from the Klamath Basin Tribes, California and Oregon and current dam owners Berkshire Hathaway/PacifiCorp concluded a landmark agreement in November 2020 to bring the State of California and Oregon on the license as new owners and operators of four dams on the Klamath River. The side agreement breaks the logjam that threatened dam removal and puts the ambitious plan to revitalize the Klamath river back on track.

The dam removal project, now scheduled for 2023, will result in restoration of over 300 miles of river habitat for salmon and other species and will constitute the largest dam deconstruction and river restoration effort ever undertaken in the U.S.



ELECTRIC TRACTOR PILOT

We have joined forces with Forth, Wy'East RC&D, Bonneville Environmental Foundation, and Rusted Gate Farm to expand rural electrification and fuel a clean agricultural economy. Starting with electric tractors, the team is setting out to demonstrate the many benefits of electrifying heavy equipment, from fuel and maintenance savings, to reduced greenhouse gas emissions and improved health conditions.

SNW and its partners purchased and shipped to Oregon three electric tractors, and starting in spring of 2021, they will be rotating to different locations around the Pacific Northwest. The tractors are different models so the group can perform rigorous testing around the state, with varied farming conditions, weather, and utility territories. We will offer technical expertise for each producer and allow them to pilot the equipment at no cost for a set period of time. The tractors – and the farmers who use them – will provide invaluable data to measure the many benefits and user experience of this emerging technology.
